This might sound familiar. There are times when we listen to the news, look at the world around us, or even life in our own families and are hard pressed to see much of the revelation of God.

seen.

That might apply to many of the young people who have participated over summer in SUSA camps and Beach Missions. But the book of Samuel has some very encouraging news.

Samuel has been given into the care of the old priest Eli, and is serving in the temple. One night God calls Samuel three times, and Samuel, thinking it is Eli calling, gets up and goes to see what Eli wants. But Eli has not called, and he realises that it is the voice of God calling Samuel. Pretty awesome!

After the second time Samuel hears the voice, the prophet writes:

Again Eli said, "Son, I didn't call you. Go back to bed." (This all happened before Samuel knew God for himself. It was before the revelation of God had been given to him personally.)

1 Samuel 3.6b.7 The Message

So here is Samuel working for the temple and the priest and he doesn't yet know God for himself - no revelation to him personally.

It makes one think - how many of us are very involved in our churches, mission organisations, even SUSA, but feel we haven't experienced that revelation of God that makes it personal, we haven't heard that calling of our name. But note that it is God who arrives and stands before Samuel, God makes the first move!

As all of us involved in SUSA - those who minister directly with children and families, those who pray, those who support both financially and in other ways - let us pray for all to hear God and to minister from that revelation. Then will our ministry be fruitful and prophetic.

Eli directed Samuel: If the voice calls again, say, 'Speak, God. I'm your servant, ready to listen." Samuel returned to his bed. Then God came and stood before him exactly as before, calling out, "Samuel! Samuel!" Samuel answered, "Speak. I'm your servant, ready to listen."

May we respond as Samuel did and just wait and see what happens!

The Teens Programs at both missions were well attended by holidaying and local young people.

The final mission held later in January was on Kangaroo Island. This was the second year of operation and led by Pete and Julie Calvert, with great support from the local Anglican Minister, the Uniting Church Pastor and the Chair of the local Church Council. A group of local ladies cooked for the team. It was an exciting time for the team, many of which were younger people to see a huge increase in numbers.

We had the right mix of people on team, (young and old), working together to help children understand why some people in the Bible went 'Bananas for God' and why we can go bananas for Him too!"


One of many highlights was to see young team members take on challenges and responsibilities. Participants are thinking carefully about what it means to be on the team in the future.

Campers heard Bible Talks from Ephesians and praised God in song; laughed during meal times, small groups and the Camp ConCErt. Friendships were forged as campers delved deeper into God's word.

We heard testimonies of God at work in people's lives. 30 young people responded for the first time to make a serious commitment for Jesus, while a large portion of camp responded to hunger more after Jesus.

One camper said "CE helped to rekindle the fire that I felt inside of me the first time I gave my heart to God".

Another camper made a commitment for the first time: "I have realised just how important Jesus is and I need him in my life."

We can't wait to see what God has in store for these youth as He builds His Kingdom through them!
