hange... inevitable but sometimes confronting and difficult. I recall a story about a minister in a parish who stood at his local railway station every week and watched the express train whiz by. When asked why he did so, he replied 'because it's the only thing in the parish I don't have to push uphill'. Unlike the minister and his parish, the changes in progress for Scripture Union do not feel like pushing uphill!

Each of the eight SU movements across Australia continue discussions around the formation of one national movement, and draft proposals have now been developed for the SUSA Council to consider following which, after feedback, these proposals will be brought to you, the members, at a later meeting.

A Transformation Agreement, which the parties will sign next year, will include guiding principles about the rationale for change, the vision for the new entity and the values behind it.

Clearly there will be a time of transition from the old structures to a new company, followed by what will probably be about three years of integration when SU national operations begin, and people, ministries, systems and processes are progressively combined to complete the formation of a national movement

This has been and continues to be a mammoth task and SU is blessed to have many very talented and competent people working towards a national movement. Crucially all are totally committed to the vision, ministry and health of SU for the decades ahead.

For us here at SUSA there is another change. I will be stepping down as Chair at the end of the year and have great delight in announcing that David Jenkinson will step into that role as from January 2020. Dave brings many skills which are perfectly suited to this stage of the life of SUSA and the National transformation project.

I thank God for the Council members and their support over the last four years - South Australia is blessed to have such a cohesive group of people who seek to prayerfully follow the will of God.

Please pray earnestly – for the national transition and our local movement, for all the volunteers and staff who make SUSA what it is. We value your prayers. Blessings

Why would they do this? They're wanted to share Jesus' love with the families of Katherine. You can't buy this kind of awesome.

Sports Based Ministry to Children

God is certainly opening new doors of ministry. This year SUSA stepped across the border into the Northern Territory to be a part of running Kids Games, a week long sports-based outreach to children, in Darwin and Katherine.

Kids Games began over 10 years ago in Darwin and now efforts are being made to expand and take it to other states.

It's a primary aged sports focused program which presents Jesus through games, drama and small groups. As a ministry it fits perfectly with the DNA of SU: It involves working with the local churches, develops volunteers, builds mission and creates outreach. Children hear the gospel presented through bible stories, drama, song and small groups.

In July, Chris Battistuzzi spent a week in Darwin to understand how it works. He met with leaders to explore its potential and how Kids Games can be used in regional centres across Australia.

SUPA Serve!

SUPA Serve is a focused leadership component of Kid's Games. Young leaders participate as a mission and leadership development experience.

They are given the opportunity to lead all activities and co-ordinate the day's events. Young leaders are supervised, mentored and guided by experienced adult leaders.

"It impacted more than the kids, it impacted us. It was a Holy Spirit filled adventure that had way more meaning than just a trip to the NT. I'm looking forward to what God has planned for our future." Joel aged 16.

The impact on the children was very evident just by watching the joy on their faces. When prayer was mentioned for the first time, some children had no concept of what prayer is or who Jesus is. By the end of the week there were kids leading the small group prayer times.

This ministry is going right back to basics. Who is God? Who is Jesus? What is prayer? Can we talk to Jesus ourselves?

The focus was on God wanting everyone, no matter who they are, where they come from or what they've done, to become part of His team.

It was wonderful to watch some children pray, dedicating their lives to Jesus.

Please pray they continue to feel God's love and provision and pray for the future of Kids Games and SUPA Serve as we work to increase this ministry alongside local churches in 2020.

SUSA were well represented with Cherith and Pearl Harvey in attendance, along with Aboriginal intern, Ema Bovoro. They were fully engaged with the program, even leading one of the days.

For the local churches this was a first as they worked together with an SU team to minister to and reach out to local children and families.

The school chaplain expressed what a wonderful gift Kid's Games was to the local children who often have nothing to do during school holidays.

The program also met a practical need by feeding hungry children. During term, the schools usually provide breakfast, recess and lunch to local children who need it. However this service isn't available during the holiday periods and those children often go hungry, eating less when school is on break.

Local churches provided fantastic morning teas and local Pastor's connected with the team. Kid's Games in Katherine was a real blessing, success and the local churches certainly want it to return in 2020.

Plans for Kids Games in 2020 are already underway as SUSA partners with SUNT in hosting the sporting event in Alice Springs, and again with SUNSW in Broken Hill.

A key part of this ministry is also developing young leaders, it's called **SUPA Serve**. Big things are happening.

In the spring school holidays, Gents Camp SA returned to where it started, utilising the new self-catering facilities at Mylor Adventure Campsite. Eighty campers, leaders, assistant leaders, tribe chiefs, and tribe elders had a blast without one digital device in sight for 5 days. The tribal wars, activities, small group discussions, and interactive spiritual input sessions were all enjoyed thoroughly and shaped perfectly for teen boys.

theme for camp. The boys loved the spiritual input sessions which explored how boys typically put their hope in objects and pursuits to prove that they are men. Each leader contributed a 'manly' item to the shrine from their late teen years. Items included a car, a gaming laptop, a phone, sporting equipment, a TV, bottles of alcohol, and more. It was a shrine that initially everyone seemed proud

On the second day, each leader told the full story connected with each item. The hope of maturity and respect they expected these items to help bring actually brought the opposite. They brought pride, pain, wasted months and years of life, and despair. One by one they destroyed these expensive items in front of the boys. Their mouths were agape. One boy cried, "Don't destroy it, give it to me!". Afterwards, they understood, and each boy put a post-it note on an item they identified with.

This proved to be a fantastic springboard for the exploration over the rest of camp of what makes a boy a man. Boys were hungry to know how Jesus meets this desire in them. The rest of the activities rounded out the whole camp as a great bonding experience.

In 2020, GENTS Camp SA will be held 3rd - 6th October, during the long weekend in the middle of the spring school holidays.

Burden for Romania

CUSA launched GENTS Camp Romania in 2019! Yes, you read that right. You probably don't know that Gents Director and SUSA Youth Coordinator, Hamilton McNicol, was once a missionary in Romania. Through his continued heart for that country and ongoing ministry contacts, the concept to begin GENTS Camp in Romania became reality this year.

A small team travelled to Romania and for months beforehand they worked hard to assist SU Romania pull it all together. They raised around \$10,000 and paid for many things out of their own funds, all to help a team of Romanians run their first GENTS Camp Romania, July 15-20. The Director of SU Romania, Cristi Maritan coordinated the logistics at the Romanian side, and recruited some excellent leaders.

There were many challenges to be overcome:

- · Language barriers.
- Boys from Rudolph Walter orphanage came a day late and had been deceived into coming. They brought drugs and cigarettes and were angry to be there.

- Almost half of campers were orphans.
- Multicultural team, and expectations
- Largely inexperienced team
- Slightly smaller team of leaders, with 2 or 3 leaders for 12 campers
- Limited resources

But despite the challenges there were some amazing results:

- 8 boys put their trust in Jesus for the first time
- 7 boys had an awakening of a dormant
- Most boys said it was the best camp of
- The initiation and general leadership development was something the Romanians had never seen before,


- and were deeply impressed how by the end of the week, they were able to make a family of a very diverse, and often challenging group (especially the orphans).
- The orphans at the end of the week were upset they had to return 'home'. They didn't want the camp to end.

Into the future:

SU Romania are very keen to run it again next year. Maybe 1 or 2 weeks later in the year to avoid clashing with exams. Here in SA we are keen to support them once more and it appears that help may also come from SU in European countries such as Norway, Switzerland and England. WOW - how great it is to be part of an international SU ministry.

Who knows, Gents camp may soon be happening in even more European nations and impacting boys lives for Christ.

GENTS Camp Romania!

he first GENTS Camp in Romania ran from July 15th to 20th near Timisoara, Romania. Josh Lines and Hamilton McNicol from Gents Camp SA went over with two other volunteers from New Zealand to join a team of Romanians for the inaugural event. Three days before camp a contingent of 20 campers pulled out. In the providence of God, a chance meeting with an orphanage director in the local markets 2 days before camp saw 20 orphans take their place. In total 43 campers and 11 leaders made an excellent sized group.

The week had plenty of challenges. Marrying a group of leaders together from three different countries took patience and problem solving. And, the inclusion of the orphans was a complete surprise to the orphans who were told they were going to the swimming pool for the day, only to find themselves arriving at a camp. They were angry, distrusting, and looking for a way to return to their orphanage which was familiar and 'safe'. The Romanian SU leaders also had no experience of working with orphan boys and were initially perplexed at how to manage their unpredictable and sometimes threatening behaviour.

At the end of the camp a Romanian leader, Daniel, commented, "On the training night we were told that our tribe will feel like family by the end of camp. I didn't know how that would be possible with the orphans, but it was true". Some of the final statements from the orphans at the end of camp was that they didn't want to go 'home'. It truly was a great example of how Jesus can transcend cultural and social barriers to bring unity.



The camp drew to a close with eight boys putting their faith in Jesus for the first time, and 7 other boys from church backgrounds choosing for themselves to put their trust in Jesus. In and through all the activities we were excited to have one of the Romanian Assistant Leaders, Adrian Ciuras, complete the initiation, who was determined to wear the GENTS signet ring by the end of the week.

SU Romania have invited us to come and run the camp with them one more time in 2020, before hopefully they can run it completely for themselves in 2021.
