irstly, as the new Chairperson for SUSA I would like to acknowledge the outgoing chairperson Vivien Bleby, and on behalf of Council and members, thank her for her contribution over the last 4.5 years.

Viv's approach was not only professional but well measured in terms of wisdom and insight, always conducting herself under the headship of the one true God. However, the word 'gracious' really says it all about her. I am

happy to say that she will be staying on as Council member.

As most of you will know the there has been a lot going on in the organisational structure of SU Australia. The probable end game will be for all state associations to merge to become one company. There is some way to go in this process and we have already achieved much in the past few years to establish sound footings for this to occur. In fact, just a little while ago on February 3rd 2020, members voted to:

- Change from a state-based association, to a company limited by guarantee;
- Adopt the name 'Scripture Union South Australia Limited':
- Adopt a new constitution to facilitate the change to a company.

As we move forward, I want to encourage you all to prayerfully consider further coming changes (as they are circulated) and certainly to take opportunity to have your say - either in agreement or disagreement.

I believe we all want the structure of this organisation to be such that the operations in the field are enhanced, efficient and effective in bringing young people to faith in Christ. The structure becomes secondary, indeed invisible when compared to the main Aims and Beliefs of SUSA and the working out of the same.

Please feel free to contact myself, Chris Battistuzzi or anyone on Council for discussion as required.

At the same time, and most importantly, we must not forget the ongoing work of SUSA and what has been going on in the field over the last few months. We had the 6 missions ready to go into the new year which included the new Mannum one, and also Kangaroo Island. Everyone is aware of what happened on KI with fires. Unfortunately, in the interest of safety and issues around capacity to serve adequately in an emergency setting, we withdrew the team. For the time being. Thanks to the many people involved, especially our President Kevin Hull, the Team Leader, who along with others exercised much wisdom and consideration given the circumstances. Watch this space.

In all of our work as SUSA (and indeed around the other state operations) we need to be in thanksgiving to God for what he has given and done for us in the past AND into the future. There is purpose in that.

However, in the context of Paul encouraging the Corinthians in their giving to the church of Jerusalem, 2 Corinthians 9:10-15, talks about using what God had given to them, not just only using it for themselves but ALSO to sow from it. Through that act, the receiver (in this case the church of Jerusalem) would not only glorify God for the "liberality of the Corinthians contribution" to them (time food, money... ministry) but would ALSO glorify God for the "obedience of the Corinthians confession to the Good News of Christ". It's the same message for us at SU and our ministry.

When things become difficult, let's not falter, as the scripture is clear in its promises. God is clear in what we are to do. So then, there is purpose in the mission of SUSA. We are at the coal-face dealing with people who search. As we go forward, be generous in all things in the name of the Father. I encourage all of us to continue on with thanksgiving and with courage.

Julie and her Rollercoaster Mission Season

The 2019-2020 Summer SU Family Mission season has been a rollercoaster journey. There have been wonderful highs and beautiful blessings but there has also been deep sadness and disappointment. This season saw 6 Mission teams plan and prepare their volunteers to show and share the love of

Jesus in fun, relevant and engaging ways to children, youth and families.

It has been about 20 years since SU last had 6 active missions. God in His kindness and generosity provided the necessary volunteers and supportive church communities to enable the recent commencement of new missions.

This season a new mission began in Mannum. We prepared and planned and then trusted God to bring the children and accomplish His work. For the churches of Mannum and the local volunteers it was a huge step of faith. They put their hands up to be part of a ministry they had never seen before. They trusted SU to bring about a program that would benefit the community of Mannum. God was at work. He brought children who needed the love and care of the team. We also shared God as the all-powerful God who made and loves them and as a personal God He can be their safe place, always ready to help them in times of trouble.

Other highs include successful missions in Pt Vincent, Moonta, and Victor Harbor. Tumby Bay saw over 200 registrations and the added blessing of someone coming to saving faith acknowledging Jesus as their Lord and saviour. All these blessings show God at work bringing about His plans and purposes.

But, while these great ministries were happening, over in Kangaroo Island a destructive bushfire wreaked havoc. People's lives were dramatically turned upside down as they helplessly waited to see if their home and belongings would survive.

The heart of the KI team was to go and be the hands and feet of Jesus, to help their friends on KI however they could. With just days before our team travelling to KI the decision was taken out of our hands and higher authorities took action preventing travel to KI by non-residents. Options are being discussed to go over to KI later this year but as yet nothing has been decided. We want to make sure that whatever we do we provide a fun, safe and meaningful activity that supports the local community.

I am so thankful to you all for your generous prayers. The safety, protection and sustaining of all the teams and participants is a visible answer we can praise God for. It was your prayers that enabled and protected each of the 6 missions- even the intervention imposed on the KI mission. Please pray for the KI team and for the people of Kangaroo Island. The recovery from the devastation and destruction of these recent bushfires will take significant time. As they rebuild and heal from their trauma please lift them into the mighty hands of our good and gracious Father.

As Missions coordinator the time required to support, train, equip and oversee 6 Family Missions is considerable. My vision is to see up to 10 Family Missions in operation over the next 5-10 years. To enable this even more time, energy and volunteers will be required. The Spiritual input in many rural communities in South Australia is next to none. To invest in these communities, working alongside the local churches to introduce children, youth and families to Jesus, is to invest in eternity.

I want to invest in eternity in this way but working 1 day a week makes this virtually impossible. Can I ask you to consider helping me invest in eternity by financially supporting me? Whatever God leads you to give will be gratefully accepted and will enable the establishment of more family missions and better support and training for our fantastic volunteers.

ort Vincent really comes alive Verran in summer. Our Family Mission kicked off with a movie night on Sunday 5th Jan, and ran primary and teens activities from Monday 6th to Friday 10th Jan. Our team of 27 were more intentional this year about being visible in the community. We were also encouraged by the growing connection with local churches.

The Sunday prior to mission our team members visited 7 churches in the area. On one evening the Gospel Church from Minlaton came and held a prayer meeting with us where we were staying. Local people were also on team.

62 children attended the primary program across the week. But it's not really about numbers at all, but about the interactions and relationships formed. One local Christian mum appreciated her son seeing the broader family of faith. For most of the year his Dad is his preacher and his Mum is his Sunday School teacher! One child when taught that prayer is talking to God, exclaimed: "I have never heard that until you said that just then!" The grandmother of one young boy was keen for him to attend, but he was shy and unsure. After coming for one day, he didn't return. But when team members saw him a day or so later at VacSwim and said hello, he was keen to return that afternoon. A parent going through a very traumatic situation found support and a listening ear in one of our team members.

In our 10-12's group we had a girl take home a copy of Luke's gospel after the first day, because she wasn't sure if she'd be able to come back and she wanted to find out more.

oonta Family Mission kicked off with a united team of 32 volunteers from different parts of Adelaide and the Copper Coast. Throughout the week, the team led up to 50 children through the book of Acts using games, crafts and songs.

Each day, children of varying ages came to the Moonta Uniting Hall to enjoy a café themed week, learning about the early church and how God's family is open to all; the lame, the dead and dead in spirit, people of different languages and even those considered unclean.

Each day also brought along a new episode to the week long slapstick drama, which the children thoroughly enjoyed.

As the week progressed, the team was able to put on a few outreach events, such as a Fun-in-the-Caravan Park, a Movie Night and a Talent Night. The Movie Night outreach, allowed for building of community amongst the team, the children and families. Afterwards, Craig Loveday shared a reflection, tying in the movie into the week's theme of God's family and all being welcome.
