Recently I did what I call a 'Ministry Road Trip' to Eyre Peninsula, the Mid North and Yorke Peninsula. For 8 days I met with many local pastors, SU volunteers, leaders and others to listen, discuss and explore how SU can support and partner with them in local outreach ministry. It was also an opportunity to connect with and encourage established SU ministry like the Tumby Bay Family Mission and Kids Camp EP.

The exciting thing is that passion and interest is growing to see more local outreach and SU can be a vehicle to help this happen. The challenge is how we do this with limited time and resources.

While donations may be shrinking for many reasons, the opportunities for ministry are growing. In Minlaton (Yorkes) a new SU ministry team has been formed with a first goal to run a SUPA Holiday Club in April 2021.

In the Kadina area there's renewed interest to get involved with Family Missions and hopefully start a SUPA Club. Very encouraging meetings held which may lead to new SU ministry in Whyalla, Cowell, Cleve, Stansbury and Tumby Bay.

From the Chair

Recently I was thinking about Jesus being described as the Word and it then took me to thinking about the power of the spoken word. There are many scriptures around this and many warnings about the use of our tongues.

"... but no human being can tame the tongue...With it we bless our Lord and Father,

and with it we curse people who are made in the likeness of God." - James 3:8-9

How can that be? We must look for the Lord's instruction through the Spirit before we speak, so that when we speak into people lives, we measure our words carefully.

Proverbs 15:1-2 by way of an example in application says: "A soft answer turns away wrath, but a harsh word stirs up anger. The tongue of the wise commends knowledge, but the mouths of fools pour out folly."

Interestingly, the word wisdom is tied into the formula. We know that wisdom is a gift we as Christians can ask for and receive.

All of the work done by SUSA staff and volunteers involves the specific message of hope, love and peace that Christ offers to everyone, and those who are open and those who search will find that truth.

Everything is about relationship and communication as part of that. Many people say many things. Many voices are heard and as we all know sometimes things can be mis-interpreted.

When others speak to us, we should always ask this question: What is the intent behind the words? This is a wonderful tool to assist us in the interpretation, because not everyone is perfect at delivery, at putting things in an eloquent fashion or having a full knowledge of the relevant language. Unfortunately, when we speak to others, they may not ask the same question of us. So, it's very important that we think about what we say and how we deliver it. All sorts of positive meaning can be lost in bad delivery.



A year ago I found myself in exactly this situation. An old acquaintance contacted me wanting to meet up and discuss something that had troubled him for the past 10 years. He explained that at that time of sharing with me details of an unfortunate situation that he had found himself in, my interpretation of what he had said led me to respond in a way that seemingly lacked compassion, but was more practical in nature. I missed the mood and missed the opportunity. I remembered that my "intent" was not to be dismissive of the difficulty, but to be honest in what I could offer. Clearly, that was not received. Badly put words can have long lasting effects, in this case 10 years. Well, we put things right and I was forgiven I'm happy to say. Just long overdue and completely avoidable.

I encourage us all, in all of our work and play, to hand our tongues to the Lord so that the words we speak are HIS words. Words of encouragement, of kindness, of upbuilding, of loving instruction and so on; words full of good intent and of mindful delivery based on the wisdom we receive from Him.

Finally, the ultimate intent of what we do is to bring people to the Lord such that "...every tongue (will) acknowledge that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father." (Phillippians 2:11)

SUSA through its staff and volunteers (all of us) impacts lives daily. May our words be the right words.

Gents Camp is Awesome!

We had just over 100 men and teen boys on camp with five completing the initiation, an experience symbolising moving from being a boy to a man. The SPIT Drama (Spiritual Input) centred on how God is a loving Father who is preparing an inheritance for his sons that he will adopt (Romans 8:14-21).

There were lots of chances for spiritual reflection and many of the boys opened up about their own experiences of fatherhood, from not having a present or living father to poor fathering and those who have been excellent dads. All of this fed into how we can have a powerful relationship with God who is our perfect and always present

We heard twelve different testimonies, each of which helped us to see that we're all fighting similar battles together. Typically, as males, we hide our struggles as they instil shame and a sense of weakness. But God, in Jesus, breaks this and turns our testimony into an illumination for others (Eph 5:13).

Five of those testimonies came from our Year Twelve initiates, who spoke with passion, conviction and vulnerability. These were truly powerful and moving testimonies which characterised what The Apostle Paul said, "When I am weak, then I am strong". For the younger boys to hear that the confidence of their role models on camp comes from acknowledging their weaknesses, relying on God and knowing their identity is found in Jesus, was priceless.

On the last morning God was deeply at work in the campers of whom eleven responded to the call on their lives from God. They showed courage and vulnerability when asked to kneel in front of the rest of the camp to acknowledge their commitment to follow Jesus and live for Him. The whole camp then surrounded these boys lifting them up in prayer. We thank God for the work that He was doing in the hearts of all the boys on the weekend, and we honour him and give all the glory.

Where are they now? An interview with Matt Peters.



Through Tragedy to Leading SA's Biggest Youth Ministry

att Peters is the Coordinator of XS Youth at Seeds Church. XS has a youth ministry of about 200 youth,

which includes 60 leaders. Matt Peters attended SU Youth Leadership Week in 2011 when he was in year 12. He returned in 2012 to help lead a cohort of emerging leaders as a facilitator.

What challenges were you facing prior to YLW?

My dad who was a pastor started to get sick when I was starting high school. He was later diagnosed with early onset dementia. That was really hard for me over my high school years, I was wrestling with my faith and how a good God could allow suffering in the world.

How was God at work in you through YLW?

I was nominated to go by my youth group leader - Pete Riggs. I had to trust him as I had no idea what it was about. I immediately loved being pushed outside my comfort zone leading in my small group. Having to think for myself more and lead. I hadn't been in any leadership role that much before.

I was wrestling with questions about suffering and had great conversations with my facilitator on YLW about this. It was really foundational for how I lead now and helped me, as the passage in 2 Corinthians (1:4) says, comforting others with the same comfort that you have

How did YLW help in your journey afterwards?

Going along as an emerging leader helped me identify that leadership was something I was passionate about. And then going along as a facilitator, to be honest really stretched me. It started in me a passion for leading and developing leaders. Learning how to draw strengths out of people is a passion I have found in leading a large leadership team. I can look back now and say that YLW was the start of my journey.

One of my passions with youth is to have a space where young people feel like they belong and can wrestle with tough life questions. The answer is Jesus, but how do you work that out when the rug gets pulled out from underneath you. I used to think I only needed to hear one sermon that would give me all the answers and then I would be sorted. But no! That's for me to work through and it's not just one thing that straightens you out.

What would you say to the generous supporters of SU who have given so that camps like Youth Leadership Week were able to run?

Their giving has definitely been worthwhile in my life. But that fruit has been multiplied for other people who I lead. Youth Leadership Week helped me be a better leader. For example I'm meeting with three year 11 and 12s tonight to help them prepare to tag team preach next week at youth. I love that. Youth Leadership Week helped me see how to help raise others

How do you see the local church partnering with Scripture Union in mission and discipleship?

I would say equipping leaders to lead others. Leader training and resources for them to use with youth. Young leaders know how to do relational, but lack knowledge of what it means to disciple young people. We want to have fun and we want to enjoy our time together, but what does it look like to do life together and disciple along the way.

SUPA Club Explosion



SUPA Clubs and ministry has been a key activity for sharing the gospel with children, especially in schools, for several decades. Teams usually comprise volunteers from several local churches, all working together to reach local children and families.

The traditional lunch time clubs had been gradually decreasing over the years due to shorter school lunchtimes and challenges to get available school hours volunteers, but with some vision, innovation and effort a whole new field of SUPA Ministry is starting to take hold. It's a SUPA Explosion!

After School SUPA Clubs still link directly with their local school, but hold their club offsite after school. This might be directly after or later, like a Friday evening. But wait there's more!

A few years ago Chris Battistuzzi, working with churches in Port Pirie, developed SUPA Holiday Clubs and other outreach activities under the SUPA banner. Port Pirie now runs 5 SUPA events each year. Their most recent being an SU LIGHT Party, which uses Halloween as a way to share about the Light Jesus is and brings into the world.

Lately Chris has been catching up with all our Clubs as they seek to restart under CCoVid19 restrictions. He has travelled to Birdwood and Springton to meet with, train and encourage our teams. Visits to other clubs including a trip to Bordertown, are being planned.

During his recent trip to EP and Yorkes, Chris spread the word about SUPA and a new SUPA Team has been formed in Minlaton which intends to hold a SUPA Holiday Club In April 2021. There's also keen interest for SUPA Club activities in Cleve, Kadina and Stansbury.

Our newest lunchtime club is set to start next year at the combined campus school or Pilgrim, Aberfoyle Park and Thiele.

Coming in 2021 will be some combined SUPA events like SUPA Arvo and SUPA Camp, held on a weekend.
