From the Chair



Sometimes I ask "How is it that so much goes on in everyone's lives that it keeps them busy all the time?" It's a bit like a cupboard. No matter how big, we manage to completely fill it, even if it is with junk.

I have been reading a book called "The Last Arrow" by Erwin McManus. In his book he is talking about us all having a quiver full of arrows and using them all in our work for Jesus on this planet, saving none for the next life. He

says we are to be forward looking and set fire to the past so that we are not constantly drawn back into it. *What do we think about that concept?*

I'm sure you will be thinking we need the past as a source of wisdom, which is true. But reliance on our past experiences might also constrain creativity, constrain stepping out, constrain moving out of our own "definition".. maybe even constrain God because we think we know how to do it, with all of our experience.

This book is about application and making it count. We can take up an awful lot of time and headspace doing things that on balance maybe don't count for a lot, or distract us from the things that do count.

In my previous job we had this thing about working out what things were urgent and important. Most things that are important can also be urgent, but not everything.... so I learnt to rank them. Not many urgent things are not important... in fact I can't think of any!

In the book, the author says that "passion" is the fuel that brings urgency, and leadership is about bringing urgency to the things that matter most. Good to think about.

So using the arrows is not so much about maximising our personal potential for its own sake, but allowing ourselves to be consumed in what God has for us and using all the arrows given to us. We don't choose where the plane will land, but we choose if we get on it in the first place...the writer says. Then we are committed. We are now moving past what we ourselves can do of ourselves, and into letting what God wants to do through us. He can create that passion in us! We can now have profound intention. We can now move to giving "all" in what He has called us to.

I am one who firmly believes I have been created for purpose and have been given the gifts, abilities, armoury, energy, strength that will allow that purpose to be achieved. I should not want to settle for average. I do have a responsibility given. Will I be able to say I gave it my best, letting that God given passion drive me? Or did I give it a bit; an average?

I have a passion for looking for the lost sheep. It's in me and it's not going away. I know it's been given to me for God's purposes. However, I was once told by a mature Christian that it was a complete waste of time. Not encouraging really, but of no consequence because that was the understanding that God and I had, and I understood his call to me. The Christian had his own call(s), his own passion to work with. Comparisons were not important.

Because God is merciful, loving, forgiving and empowering we can use that as a stable platform from which to go boldly to complete HIS purpose(s) passionately. (ref Romans 8:28 NIV)

As Erwin McManus puts it, before you die (here on earth), live the life you were born to live!

Maybe we can ask ourselves a few questions in context of our contribution to the work of SU, or just in general:

What are the passions God has given me and am I using all of my arrows?

Am I respectful of His call on me? What am I doing about it in terms of urgency?

Is my passion limited to what has been, as opposed to what could be?

'Work willingly at whatever you do, as though you were working for the Lord rather than for people. Remember that the Lord will give you an inheritance as your reward, and that the Master you are serving is Christ.' Colossians 3:23,24

Our first SQUAD camp will be over the October long weekend. Our vision is to see teenage girls grow alongside one another, supported by a crossgenerational sisterhood of women, being spiritually, socially and emotionally equipped for the transition into womanhood.

Why SQUAD?

Well, your SQUAD are your people, your team – those who are in your corner, cheering you on and supporting you.

A SQUAD is active. It has focus, purpose and drive and works towards its goals together. In the SQUAD everyone is welcome, valued and accepted. Just like the body of Christ, everyone has a role to play! The SQUAD are working together to train in godliness (1 Tim 4:7), run the race with perseverance (Heb 12:1) and press on toward the goal to win the prize (Phil 3:14).

This camp is about finding your SQUAD; the friends and mentors who can be in your corner, championing you, building you up and helping you to follow Christ and become the woman God has created you to be. It will be fun, it will be active and it will give you a chance to explore your gifts and passions in an atmosphere of support and love.

Seasonal Pruning



With joy and excitement I'm delighted to share with you how our faithful God enabled Scripture Union Family Missions to safely run during the COVID Pandemic. Three Missions ran programs and two engaged with the

community in new ways. Overviews of each Mission are separate to this article. My congratulations goes to all Team Members and Team Leaders who showed immense perseverance and resilience to show and share Jesus to communities throughout SA.

To plan and prepare a team and a program for Family Missions is not easy but when you add the unprecedented COVID pandemic to the mix it becomes almost impossible. In faith we believed God would make the impossible possible. His work began in the hearts of each team. Each Team Leader and team were given the passion and desire to want to connect and engage and keep building on past relationships. They wanted to tell of the love and hope found in Jesus. This was fundamental to the process and the outcome. It would have been easier to say 'it's all too hard let's give mission a miss, people will understand.' But they didn't give up. They rose to the challenge with tears and COVID safe plans and adherence to government regulations.

COVID forced us to change what we had always done. We were forced to re think what we do and how to do it. Change is hard. We often resist it but as you keep looking to Jesus to endure and persevere it brings more fruit and incomparable joy. Jesus says to his disciples in John 15:2-4 "The Father cuts off every branch in me that bears no fruit, while every branch that does bear fruit he prunes so that it will be even more fruitful.....Remain in me, as I also remain in you. No branch can bear fruit by itself; it must remain in the vine. Neither can you bear fruit unless you remain in me." Family Missions has been fruitful but we were in need of making some changes, to undergo pruning and so the COVID shake up was God's perfect timing for some of the Mission teams to do exactly that.

The teams began thinking, planning and preparing early. New and different options were suggested, talked through and implemented. This journey helped unite and strengthen the teams. More evidence of God at work. Some teams decided to run for one or two days and others a full program. Each Team came to their decision after much prayer and discussion. God had guided them and revealed how best to proceed. I think this season has shown the teams that they can change and do things differently and while it may have caused temporary challenges and frustrations, the outcome was positive and fruitful. Our faithful God has again proven Himself bringing about what seemed impossible to be possible. The timing of circumstances has led to pruning and I'm confident that the benefits of future promised fruitfulness will come as we keep looking to and trusting in the saviour of the world, Gods only Son, Jesus Christ.

Gents Camp Father & Sons



Covid did everything it could to try and hijack Gents Camp Father and Sons in 2020. Initially the camp had to be rescheduled from its April date to November. Then one week after camp, Covid returned to bring everything into lockdown again. What a relief! Camp was a super success in its second year and booked out with sixty fathers and sons. Douglas Scrub campsite proved to be a great venue again.

A few activities have started to establish themselves as permanent features of camp including the Friday Night Feast, Fatherhood 'Fire Up' with a guest speaker, The Greatest Story Ever Told, Survivor, amongst numerous other things. Archery Tag was again a stand out this year, but no-one will forget the midsize trebuchets we made that could launch a 'bomb' 100 metres.

This year we consolidated our ethos for camp and set this framework up as the beginning of a much bigger suite of Gents Ministry resources to help dads and communities of dads be intentionally involved with sons in weekly and daily ways. This framework has much support in education, sociology, psychology, and even anthropology, which is why the camp works for dads and sons from all sorts of backgrounds. However, the main influence on this framework is biblical. God the Father is the one most interested in how faith is passed on to "your children, and their children after them may fear the Lord your God" (Deut 6:1).

Much of the traditional ways that fathers have been involved with sons has been diminishing and replaced by schooling, screens, and mothers. Though mums are great, boys need more than mums!

The Old Testament finishes with a summary with how deep the problem of Israel was before Jesus and the essential foundations of the new movement. The prophet Malachi says, "The hearts of fathers will be turned to their sons and the hearts of sons to their fathers".

We had a lot of great fathers on camp with their sons, but the shared sentiment of these dads was clear. This is a really important kingdom thing that we've drifted from in Australia. It's not a peripheral matter. This is core business for the church.

This year interest in the camp has increased significantly. Many will miss out, unfortunately! SU plans to use camp in May as an apprenticing opportunity for teams of dads. Camp packs and resources developed by SU will help these dads run the camp themselves for their local area. We know that shifting the ownership of camp to the local scene will see many more dads and sons get involved; Christian and non-Christian. And that's exciting!
