Working with churches, we will continue to help children, young people and families experience God's love and Good News through missions and camps, in schools, and in local communities. The ministry you have invested your time, prayer, and finances in is ongoing.

#### What about the future of SU in SA?

Be assured that your support in all kinds will continue to enable ministry into SA and with new national resources we are planning for growth to increase the reach of SU across the state and see more children and young people introduced to Jesus.

I will continue as the Director of a region that covers most of SA and crosses the border in a few strategic places. Our staff will continue to serve in their normal roles but overtime become incorporated into and better supported through SUA staff and structures. A key part of the national rollout will be placing District Workers in areas identified by the leadership and in SA our hope is to have 2 to 3 new staff who live and work in regional SA, supported by myself and the other staff.

This will be fantastic as we have more opportunities than we can cater for, especially in regional SA.

### From the Chair



Well, the National Merger is underway with SUSA members voting unanimously on the 8th May, 2021 for the adoption and implementation of "the Scheme" as defined in the documents that were delivered to all members in March 21. Around Australia (excluding NSW, who are not part of the merger but remain affiliated and open) the vote in favour was approximately 95%. What an historic moment. Of

course, there is still much work to do in terms of the more important thing of developing and growing the ministry.

We all look forward to seeing what God will continue to do and we know He will do what He intends to do with this organisation through his people. Why is that? There have been thousands of people praying for thousands of cumulative hours over the last 4 years since the National concept commenced, and God answers prayer.

At the members meeting I spoke briefly about making God's "Good News" known to children, young people, and families. This is what SUSA and the whole movement has been about and will continue to be a about. No change!

So, what is Good News? The world is packed with information these days. It's instantly accessible. The problem becomes how to determine what is truth and what is not. We have all heard the term "Fake News" which alludes to the same problem. With time being a finite resource, there is little of it to truly work the answers out. The speed of new information coming inwards overcomes the ability to absorb it all. There is much danger in this and there is much wisdom required when using that information. If we don't know what is true, how do we work out what is actually "good" or not. People see and hear news items all day and then pass it on as truth. Is it?


The word "news" finds its origins in France in the 14th century and means "new things". It means new information about something that happened recently. This is what Google told me ... so it must be right, yes? Point made. And it follows that Good News is "someone or something that is positive, encouraging, uplifting, desirable, or the like". Presumably it's true.

For Christians like ourselves, the term "Good News" is part of everyday vocabulary and means one thing in the biblical context. How do we offer that to non-Christians, so they get what it means in their own context. How do we offer that to non-Christians, so it stands out above all the other things on offer in this consumer world; all the other News and current alternatives on offer in this world? The interesting thing is that this Good News didn't happen recently per the definition above but rather is entrenched in history. And maybe therein lies a problem. Today's person who is exposed to the latest of everything receives the Biblical "Good News" as old News, and news that isn't actually that great, if in fact they understand that terminology at all. Whatever it is, it's not the latest.

As the world darkens and as over time people find no fulfilment in all the offers and promises given as truth, given as liberating, and given as fulfilling, the "Good News" will become terminology that will again be seen as just that. The irony is that the "Good News" is very current, not historical because it is a living thing. It's as relevant as it has always been. It will always be current. People may miss that. Our delivery of it in understandable language must therefore never cease, for we are the sowers who need to be dedicated, persevering, and committed. God, as always will do the rest.

The GOOD NEWS is that through Jesus's death on the cross and His resurrection there will be reconciliation between man and God for those who believe. IT IS TRUE.

# Easter Camps



# Mid North Camp



Over Easter I took some of my youth up to the Mid-North Easter Camp. Mid-North EC is a shining light and example of faithful endurance.

It became apparent to me this year that we had a pretty special snap shot of the fruit of this Good News as well as what is behind young people leaving the church in droves since World War 2.

On camp this year we had every pair of leaders who has directed this camp going back over 20 years (with exception to Jordy & Sam Smith, and Natarnia Drysdale (nee Nieass).

Mid-North Easter Camp has had great young camp directors who have then, in turn, been great mentors after finishing directing. Sometimes this is seen in a handover year when directing was coheld, or in past camp directors returning to just be of assistance (even in the kitchen) to ensure that the camp was supported wherever it was most needed.

Today, when leaders finish, they hang on too long, but typically disappear immediately (usually with good intentions) to 'give space' for the next person. In reality, this leads to potential young leaders going elsewhere, and so much lost momentum and good culture.

This makes it harder for the incoming leaders to build something again. Thus, while it is easy to critique past leaders, it actually is a bigger culture problem of how to pass the baton on well.

The model Jesus gave of discipleship can be seen in his first and last words to his disciples:

"Follow me and I will make you fishers of people" (Mat 4:19), and

"go and make disciples of all nations... teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you." (Mat 28:18-20) To disciple others like Jesus did, means to disciple them so they can disciple others, so they can disciple others ...and so on. Jesus' model was a family model. Not a business model. It meant passing on responsibility asap, but hanging around to mentor or play 'grandma/ grandpa' roles so that good culture is maintained while new spiritual 'parenthood' is established (See also Num 8:23-26).

The Mid-North Easter Camp continues today through this baton passing legacy. Consequently, God again was at work in significant ways this year through the unity of The Spirit in leaders AND youth. This ministry is a great blessing to Scripture Union and to the church of the Mid-North and we thank them and God for their faithful service over many years.

Everyone connects with God differently so we want to facilitate different spaces where youth can find relationship.

Secondly, connection through community. We value fellowship and desire to facilitate a space where lifelong supportive Christian friendships are made.

Thirdly, the renewing of their minds. In a world where there is so much uncertainty and lies, we want to renew minds with the living truth and security of the Word of God.

Through the partnership with regional churches and Christian communities, Melrose Easter Camp brought the restorative power of God into the youth's lives this year. The Lord moved mountains for camp this year so all we can say is bring on Easter Camp 2022!!

## Fruit that will last

hy have so many young people been leaving the church for over 60 years? Many people have written about this in recent decades to distil what's going on. The tricky thing about this question is what level of analysis do you apply? My conviction is that Jesus is still (if not more so) as relevant as ever as Lord and Saviour for our youth. So, what's going on?

Recently as part of the emerging GENTS Ministry, I wanted to develop a devotional for churches to help communities of faith reverse this multi decade trend in Australia. This resource will be available as part of the GENTS Ministry suite for dads who come on GENTS Father and Sons camp.

The Bible covers the history of faith over millennia. We are not the first generation to see a nation walk away from the true God nor ask the question, "Where did faith go?", and "How does faith transfer successfully from one generation to the next?". As I looked across all of Scripture in developing this devotional, I was astounded how clear the message was of how this works; the predictable challenges, and some wisdom on supporting details for community ownership of this enterprise. As I did this, the Gospel of Jesus became so much clearer to me. I thought I knew the Bible well!?!?

The Gospel I once was taught was about the hope of where I go when I die - Jesus saved me from Hell. Though I still believe and rejoice at the eternal re-unification Jesus has brought me with God, I now see a bigger Gospel than my previous individualistic framework. The prophet Malachi prophesies the sign of the coming era of the Messiah. But it was more than a sign, it was the essence of the problem they could not overcome without Jesus.

"See, I will send the prophet Elijah to you before that great and dreadful day of the Lord comes. He will turn the hearts of the fathers to their sons, and the hearts of the sons to their fathers; or else I will come and strike the land with total destruction" (Mal 4:5-6)

The history of the nation Israel had never passed on faith successfully to the next generation. If one generation had faith, they prospered, and then neglected to teach the next generation how to 'not forget The LORD' (e.g. see Deut 6:10-12, Judges 3:7). No generation back to back for the entire

history of Israel maintained faith. Israel, then, failed in its mandate to be a light to the nations. The Good News of Jesus meant lasting fruit would now be possible (Luke 1:17; John 15:16).

- New interest exists in Kadina and Port Augusta. Please pray about these new opportunities.

So, how does SUPA work? SU staff support, resource and train local volunteers, usually inter-church teams, to host local outreach activities or a weekly SUPA Club, with a specific focus on connecting through local schools and churches.
